



### **Air quality monitoring remains top priority**

In the *SCCAS Winter 2015 Newsletter*, SCCAS Director Louis Legal outlined areas that require baseline air quality data collection and ways that the Society can work toward securing funding for designing and establishing SCCAS's *Baseline Air Quality Data Collection for Howe Sound* project. (That article has been adopted as a position paper by SCCAS.)

Since its publication, several events of note have helped to shape strategic approach and AQ monitoring project development as SCCAS moves forward in its efforts to ensure clean air for Sunshine Coast residents.

**BC CLEAR** – After successfully passing The Fraser Basin Council's BC Clean Air Research Fund (BC CLEAR) Phase I application for funding long-term air quality data collection and monitoring for the Sunshine Coast and Howe Sound, the Phase

II proposal was rejected because of weakness in methodology; however, FBC invited SCCAS to reapply in the following grant cycle. To that end, the Society is now working closely with AQ meteorologist Dr. Douw Steyn, Professor of Boundary Layer Meteorology, Mesoscale Meteorology, and Air Pollution Meteorology at UBC. The next BC CLEAR program was announced hours before this publication; deadline for submission is October 30, 2015. A preliminary meeting with Dr. Steyn, Louis Legal, and ED Jools Andrés is scheduled for late September.

**Health Impact Symposium** – SCCAS coordinated and hosted an AQ symposium on April 25, 2015 at the Seaside Centre in Sechelt (*Keep Our Air Clean – What We Can Do*). Although there was a modest turnout (approx. 45), in part due to concurrent community events, excellent content from our speakers and strong engagement from attendees was encouraging. A summary of our report is featured on page 3 and a detailed report sent to our major funder (the Sunshine Coast Regional District, 2014 Rural Grants-In-Aid

program, \$1,500), is available on request.

**Further funding** – This spring and summer the SCCAS has been successful in securing support to refine project methodology for long-term AQ data collection in the region (Sunshine Coast Regional District, \$1,300); and for overall Society operations and BC CLEAR grant application and administration costs (BC Ministry of Environment, \$5,000).

**Research assistance** – UBC's Dr. Douw Steyn is connecting SCCAS with graduate students in meteorology to explore mutual benefit by combining their doctoral research with the Society's AQ monitoring project objectives. Look for more on this exciting development over the next months.

**Other programs** – The BC Ministry of Environment has announced that the provincial Wood Stove Exchange program funding will be renewed for 2016; SCCAS will know their funding amount before the end of the year. (In 2015, SCCAS was awarded \$15,000 and administered 30 exchanges.) In addition, the District of Sechelt has granted SCCAS \$1,500 to augment rebates to those replacing old wood stoves with non-wood burning options. See page 4 for more information.

## Citizen engagement crucial to prevent air quality degradation

**Louis Legal, SCCAS Director, interviews UBC AQ expert Dr. Douw Steyn, Professor, Boundary Layer, Mesoscale, and Air Pollution Meteorology, UBC**

*LL: As an air quality expert, is air pollution a real problem worldwide? What about locally, in the Sunshine Coast/Howe Sound area?*

*DS: Air pollution is one of the grand environmental problems we face today. It ranks with global warming and the attendant effects on terrestrial and marine ecosystems, pollution of fresh water, desertification, [and] destruction of natural habitat and the resultant extinction of species. It has local (especially urban), regional, and global expressions. Most concerning is the hemispheric distribution of long-lived pollutants. When compared with badly polluted jurisdictions, Sunshine Coast / Howe Sound does not suffer from degraded air quality.*

*You have been involved in a number of air quality research projects in Howe Sound. What were your major findings in this regard?*

The partial de-industrialization of Howe Sound has resulted in a marked improvement of air quality, especially reduced sulphur from pulp mill operations. During particular meteorological conditions, Howe Sound is the recipient of photochemical smog from sources in the Lower Fraser Valley.

*Government cutbacks have reduced the monitoring of air quality on the Sunshine Coast to the point where the only continuous monitoring is done by Howe Sound Pulp & Paper in Langdale. How important is it to establish continuous ongoing air quality monitoring for Howe Sound and the Sunshine Coast (think local fire in Sechelt this summer)?*

In order to protect its status as a relatively unpolluted region, and especially in the context of planned industrial expansion (LNG operations and municipal solid waste incineration), it is imprudent to not monitor air quality widely in the Sunshine Coast/Howe Sound area in order to establish baseline conditions and to

protect against any deterioration of air quality.

*What's the most important thing that we can do as citizens of the Sunshine Coast to ensure that the air we breathe is safe?*

Take control of your own air by getting citizens engaged, develop citizen initiatives such as SCCAS, and ensure that regulators are aware of your concerns about your air quality.

*As a Society where should we be concentrating our efforts with respect to air quality?*

SCCAS should engage all Sunshine Coast/Howe Sound residents and help them understand the importance of not allowing industrial development that needlessly degrades air quality. Work to reduce emissions from existing industrial sources, [and] engage with conservation, tourism, and other groups to develop a collaborative strategy to protect your air quality.

- collaborate with other organizations protecting Howe Sound from industrial air pollution, particularly LNG operations and waste incineration;
- work with the SCRCD to ban backyard burning throughout in Area A;
- educate the public about the health hazards of wood smoke;
- continue to support Vancouver Coastal Health's effort to pass an Enhanced Smoking Bylaw in Gibsons and Sechelt; and
- continue to reduce air pollution through the provincial Wood Stove Exchange Program.

#### — SCCAS offers extra incentives!

The Sunshine Coast Clean Air Society recognizes that any wood-burning appliance creates particulates that can cause negative health and environmental impacts. To encourage those making home heating upgrades to choose non-wood fuels, SCCAS applied to the District of Sechelt for funding to increase rebates to those who qualify within the WSE program, but choose to use electric appliances. We are pleased to announce that an additional \$250 will be made available to five Sunshine Coast participating residents who upgrade to non-woodburning heating on a first-come-first-served basis.
